## ***February Speaker Preview...***

### ***Lionfish Savior of the Reef?***

#### ***Fred Riger***

Fred will be talking about the effects lionfish have had on the reefs of the Bahamas since they have spread across and colonized Atlantic waters. His talk revolves around 20+ years of daily diving around Grand Bahama and 15,000+ dives documenting, experimenting and trying to find interventions to promote coral health and protect a small area of reef. He presents a case that there is a relationship between the sudden positive change in reef conditions and the introduction of the lionfish.

Fred began scuba diving in the early 1980s. Over the past three decades, Fred has logged over 15,000 scuba dives, excluding time spent in the ocean without a scuba tank on his back. It is a rare 24 hour period that doesn't find him underwater for 2 or 3 dives. You could also say that he has well over 10,000 hours underwater. Currently, Fred is a full-time scuba instructor for Grand Bahama Scuba. He is an Instructor Trainer which is the highest level of scuba certification.

Prior to his scuba diving career, Fred spent an extended period of time in college focusing on several science disciplines, and science is a passion he continues to this day. In scuba, Fred uses his interest in science to learn about the life and issues surrounding coral reefs, shark conservation and the protection of fisheries resources.

Fred is also an avid conservationist, donating his time to several projects. He is currently president of the Grand Bahama Dive Association. He is also married to Melinda, a published underwater photographer.

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***April Speaker Preview...***

***Pelagic Magic***  
***Wayne Sentman, the Oceanic Society***

It was dark, and for a brief moment I almost wanted to get back in the boat. All of a sudden something green and silver floated directly in front of my mask, and I watched it expanded in size from 2 inches to about 10. Calming down, I saw that all around me were these amazing gelatinous creatures, glowing, pulsating, and swirling around me, like a Dr. Seuss imagined planktonic snowstorm.



That was my introduction to the Pelagic Magic black water dive tour offered in Kailua-Kona, Hawaii. This is an unparalleled sensory experience not to be missed. As the sun sets you are taken out about 3 miles offshore. Once there, a drift anchor is deployed and in the pitch black open ocean the divers get ready and descend to about 40 feet. You are tethered to a line on the boat and each diver has a powerful dive light. Once you stop crying for your mommy and settle down, it is truly one of the most fascinating and calming experiences you can imagine. I probably saw 100 creatures and had absolutely no idea what they were, other than really cool. Despite the amazingly thorough dive briefing, I realized I would be doing really well simply to identify 15% of what I saw. I managed to last about 65 minutes before my air was down to 200 psi and I finally pulled myself away from the middle of the psychedelic light show.



My experience was pretty typical, but on some nights blue sharks come out of the blackness, or larval swordfish appear, translucent in front of you.

## ***Trip Report: Adventures on an Oil Rig: Diving Sipadan and Borneo by Frank Delargy***

During this trip to Malaysian Borneo we explored both above and below. We stayed at 3 places in the rainforest, Tabin Wildlife Reserve, Sukau Forest Lodge and Sepilok Rainforest Lodge. There was much to see including orangutans at the 3 places mentioned above plus near the Gomantong Caves. While diving we stayed at SeaVentures, a converted oil rig that was parked about a 1/2 kilometer off the island of Mabul.

SeaVentures was a good base for diving. Since there were very few people when we were there, we were able to go to Sipadan any day that we wished. We could have gone every day, but we choose to go to Mabul and Kapalai on one of the days. Although I had seen reports of little current, there was often quite a current under the rig. Current, combined with the 60 foot depth, my propensity to use a lot of air and the lack of larger tanks all made the dives under the rig a bit too short (for me). There was plenty of life under the rig, but if I were to go back to Sipadan, I would choose somewhere on Mabul where I could do 20-30 feet shore dives, even if it would cost me the opportunity to dive Sipadan every day.

Some of the highlights of diving at Sipadan and Mabul were the large schools of barracuda, bumphead parrotfish, anemonefish, mandarin fish and turtles everywhere. A wonderful diversity of creatures.

The diving at Mabul (the island near the SeaVentures Rig) was great although the visibility was poor, especially compared to Sipadan. Although the diving under the rig was good, there were some drawbacks. The bottom is 60 feet and there was often quite a bit of current. We often had to



wait several times for the tide to change before going in. Even then, the current on the top could be pretty strong and with the poor viz, you could get turned around and come up on the wrong side of the rig.

We upgraded to the VIP suite, about 4 times the size of the regular rooms. It was worth it as I needed the room for my computer and photo gear. Wireless was hit or miss, mostly miss, in our room on the 4th floor. This is an oil rig and although converted, it still feels like an oil rig, even if you are in the captains quarters. The food on the rig was OK, not great. Just be prepared for noodles and hot dogs for breakfast. and a menu that is heavily weighted towards Chinese and Malaysian cuisine.

The dive setup (equipment, etc) was really efficient, although it took me a while to get the hang of where to get a clean towel. Although the description on the web implies a complete computer/photo room setup, I had a hard time finding US compatible outlets to use, even though it was far from full of divers. Converters and adapters are essential.

The diving was a lot of fun. If I were to go back to Sipadan, personally I would probably stay on Mabul so that I could take advantage of the shallower shore diving. I am sure I would have been underwater a lot longer there. All in all I recommend SeaVentures and Sipadan as a destination. If you want to maximize your trips to Sipadan, I do recommend SeaVentures.
