From Boston: (about 30 miles) Take 93 / SE Expressway to 128 N / 95 toward Dedham to Rt. 24 south toward Fall River. That's a left hand exit, so get over soon after merging onto 128. Now going on 24 south, pass Brockton, and take the Rt. 104 exit for Bridgewater / Raynham. At the end of the ramp, bare right toward Raynham. Go about two miles until you come to a stop sign at a four way irregular intersection. You will be looking across at a mini mall with a Tedesgies, Crown Dry Cleaners, and P.O. Bare left, still on Rt. 104. Take your first right after the P.O. , etc., onto Lakeview Drive, #26 will be second house on left. Natural Cedar boards.

From 495: Take the Rt. 138 south toward Taunton exit. Go about a mile and look for a building shaped like a huge Milk Bottle on the left, and a Texaco. It is a congested area, so slow down and look for a left hand turn onto Center Street. Go about a mile to a mile and a half to the same four way intersection above, with the Tedesgies, Crown Dry Cleaners, and P.O., but continue straight through. You have the right of way and do not need to stop, but take the first right after this mini mall onto Lakeview Drive.

The dive season is in the full swing and the warm air and balmy waters of the Atlantic Ocean attracting lot of divers.

Generally divers are very nice people, but as in any population bad apples bound to be found. Unfortunately as a single bad apple can spoil the whole barrel, one badly behaving diver can tarnish reputation of the whole community.

Few weeks ago while unpacking gear at Magnolia Rocks I was approached by a Gentleman who lives in the house facing the sea and owns the land leading to the rocks from which people dive. He asked us not to trespass on his property (the No Trespassing and Private Property signs were posted next to the path leading to the rocks) and go diving somewhere else. I've asked him about the well maintained path to the rocks and he admitted that he made it for divers. As a former diver himself, he didn't mind people diving off his property. However recently, according to him, things got out of hand. When pressed for details he mentioned group of divers lighting a fire on the rocks and rowdy crowds. What is CoastSweep?

Massachusetts' Annual Statewide Beach Cleanup Every year the cleanups are led by a dedicated group of local coordinators who in 2001 organized over 4,000 volunteers who collected almost 70,000 pounds of trash and marine debris from 190 locations. That's over 180 miles of Massachusetts' coastline! COASTSWEEP is part of an international campaign organized by The Ocean Conservancy, formerly the Center for Marine Conservation, in Washington, DC. Participants all over the world collect marine debris and record the types of trash they collect. This information is then used to help reduce future marine debris problems.

At Bell circle take Route 1a (Lynn, fork right at Nahant/Swampscott sign to Nahant rotary. Take first right off of rotary. go over causeway and stay on Nahant Road to its end. Marine Lab is on the left at East Point at the end of Nahant Road.

From the North Shore: From Routes 128& 95 South: Take exit for Route 1 South. Take exit for Lynn/Route 129 East. Follow 129A to its eastern end at the ocean. Take a right and follow the water to Nahant rotary. Take second left off of rotary, go over causeway and stay on Nahant Road to its end. Marine Lab is on the left at East Point at the end of Nahant Road.

Cool Encounters By Brandy A. Derickson

The coolest encounters are, of course, those Kodak moments when you don't have your camera. On a couple of my most recent dives, I didn't have my camera on purpose.

During the month of July, most of my dives were for REEF's Great Annual Fish Count. I decided since I would be carrying a large slate for keeping count of the fish species I saw, as well as the dive flag, the camera could stay on shore.

About half-way through the dive, I had seen only one fish (a rock gunnel). I was thinking there had to be more than that! I couldn't send in a survey with only one fish counted! Just then, a large school of Pollock came into view. It was very surreal to be among this silvery school of fish, with the rays of sunlight penetrating the green background.

Out of the corner of my eye, I spotted a black bass. It was about two feet long and just hanging out in the sand. I settled in the sand in front of it for a closer look. It decided to settle in front of me, about five inches away, for a closer look. We checked each other out for at least ten minutes; I was almost able to touch it!

It was time to head back for shore. That was one of the coolest experiences I've had diving! I thought of all the great shots I'd missed by leaving the camera behind. Turns out, the black bass was very sociable that day; three different buddy teams had similar encounters! We think it was fascinated by our stream of bubbles.

My next cool encounter without the camera occurred that same week, at Nubble. This time, I had planned to take the camera, but the strobe wasn't behaving. So I left it behind. Kerry Hurd and I were buddied up, along with two guys from NEADC. The viz wasn't that great and the two guys hadn't dove Nubble before. I was trying to keep my eye on them, when again out the corner of my eye I saw a long, grey tail. During my surface interval, a pair of teenage divers had asked if there were sharks here. I told them I'd never seen any. No way is there a shark here, after I just said no!

I looked again; the tail was connected to a large, grey disc. A torpedo ray? I had heard them described before; this must be it! Kerry was off videotaping something; no way was it as cool as a torpedo ray! I swam over to him and pounded on his leg to get his attention. At first, he thought I was just looking at a big grey boulder, but then he saw it. It was his first torpedo ray, too! We were able to follow it for a good ten minutes before we decided to turn back. Although I didn't have my camera, Kerry was able to get some great video shots.

I'm hoping the strobe just needs new batteries. Although I enjoyed the cool encounters, I would like at least some of them to happen when I have the camera!

IMPORTANCE OF ADHERING TO DIVE INSTRUCTIONS WHEN PARTICIPATING IN GIANT OCEAN TANK (GOT) DIVES

As Club members realize, our Club has a very special relationship with the New England Aquarium. It is the Dive Club's great privilege to be offered an opportunity to dive in the Aquarium's cornerstone exhibit, The Giant Ocean Tank (GOT). The Executive Board therefore regrets it must inform the Club membership of an incident which occurred during a recent Club dive in the GOT.

It was reported by the Aquarium's Dive Department that during the dive in question, one of the Club's divers committed various infractions, including harassment and/or touching of multiple marine animals and disregarding the instructions of the dive leader. As a result of the incident, the Aquarium independently took action to bar the individual from any future dives in the GOT. After receiving the Aquarium's report, the Executive Board contacted the member in question and provided the member with an opportunity to respond. The member did respond and disputed most of the report given by the Aquarium. Given the seriousness of the allegations, the Executive Board met on August 7 to take the matter into consideration.

Article II, Section B of the Constitution, governs membership in the New England Aquarium Dive Club, Inc. as follows:

"Membership may be revoked or suspended for just cause by a majority vote of the Executive Board."

This Constitution recognizes that the New England Aquarium Dive Club, Inc. is a unique organization since the well being of the members and the reputation of the New England Aquarium are directly dependent upon the administration of the Club. Acceptance of a membership card binds a member to the rules and By-Laws of the Club and to the decisions of those with responsibility while utilizing New England Aquarium facilities or participating in Club activities.

After considering all of the information it had been provided regarding this incident, including the member's response, the Executive Board voted to revoke the Club membership of the individual involved.

The Executive Board would like to take this opportunity to stress to all members the importance of adhering to the instructions of Aquarium staff any time a member is participating in a GOT dive or any other Aquarium-sponsored event.
