From 495 Take exit 23A (Route 9 East) and follow Rte 9 through one set of lights. Turn left onto Middle road about 1 mile past the lights. This is also the first break in the Jersey barriers since the lights. Turn left almost immediately again onto John Matthew's Road. You will now be parallel to Rte. 9 West. Follow John Matthew's to the end and then turn right onto Parkerville Road. The house is about 0.4 miles down on the right just barely past the driveway to the school on the left hand side. To find the driveway look for a very large mailbox, with fish on it on the right, opposite a street light on the left.

From Boston

Take the Route 9 West exit (towards Marlboro after tolls) from the Mass Pike. Follow Route 9 through 3 traffic lights and under the Route 85 overpass and exits. After Rte. 85 take the second right onto Parkerville Road, just past McCarthy's Pools and the WPI building. There is also a turn lane for Parkerville Road. The house is about 0.5 miles down on the right just barely past the driveway to the school on the left hand side. To find our driveway look for a very large mailbox, with fish on it on the right, opposite a street light on the left.

SCUBA Certification Course

Embark on the adventure of a lifetime! Diving is relaxing, action-packed, tranquil, adrenaline pumping, and adventurous. Imagine being in a tropical location, diving in crystal clear water, surrounded by brightly colored coral and fish, or exploring a shipwreck off the coast of an island. You and your dive buddy put on your dive equipment to enter the water and explore the abundance of marine life, all the while hovering weightlessly underwater.

Adaptive SCUBA Certification Course
in Nashua, NH with the help and instruction of
O'Donnel Diving & Adapted SCUBA, www.odonneldiving.com

Becoming a certified SCUBA diver requires a commitment of time and mastery of both academic and applied SCUBA skills. During each session, an adaptive instructor will work with you directly to help you master your skills, answer your questions and problem-solve your individual adaptations and concerns.

To accommodate your busy lives and schedules, this course will be held the fourth Saturday and Sunday of each month over the course of 5 months, January through May. You may attend any or all pool sessions necessary to master your skills, working closely with instructors and volunteers. Time will be scheduled between pool times during these weekends for academic review, videos, questions, and an exam.

This course is performance based! You must complete all necessary requirements for certification. Your PADI or NIADD certification will be received when you are able to demonstrate skill mastery, pass your certification exam, and complete your open water dives.

It is possible to complete this course in fewer than 5 scheduled weekends. Registration is limited! Sign up with family and friends, diving is a group activity to be enjoyed together!

Swimming: Competency and the ability to be comfortable in the water are stressed more than endurance. Two hundred yards as well as a ten-minute float are all that is required. You must be able to maintain a seal with your lips, and able to follow multi-step directions. The minimum age required for SCUBA is 10 years.

Cost for your Class/Pool Training	\$140.
PADI Revised Text Package	\$55.

Equipment: As a student in this course you are responsible for purchasing the following equipment.

- Dive quality Mask and Snorkel, Adjustable strap fins, Wet suit boots (for use with fins, skin protection)
(You may purchase this equipment from O'Donnel Diving)

Equipment supplied for your use by O'Donnel Diving:

- Buoyancy Control Device (BCD), Weights and weight belt, Regulator w/ Oct-Pressure gauge-Console Tank and air fill

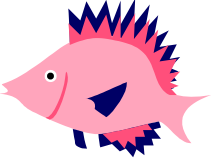
Once your class/pool training is completed, you are ready for your open water training dives. Your training dives can be completed anywhere in the world by way of a referral.

Open Water Training: Four to six dives over two-three days are required for certification. Northeast Passage and O'Donnel Diving will be scheduling open water dives this summer in June or July.

Cost includes equipment rental, all paperwork, instructor fees, and your passport photo for the certification card. **\$150**

Directions to the Knights of Columbus Hall in Arlington:

From Boston:

I-93 North. Take Rt. 16 West exit. Drive till you reach the Mass Ave. lights in Cambridge. Take a right onto Mass Ave. towards Arlington. Look for the Cambridge Savings bank on your left. Take a right at the lights onto Rt. 3A/60 East, which is Mystic St. You will see the Minuteman bike path on your left. Right after that is Winslow Ave. on your left (you will have to make a U-turn to get to Winslow Ave).

From North:

Rt. 128 South. Take exit 33A (Rt. 3A Winchester exit). Drive about 6 miles. You will go through Winchester and then to Arlington. Once you pass the Arlington Police station, which will be on your right, bear to the right onto Mystic St. (which is Rt. 3A/60 West). You will see Winslow Ave. on your right, which is just before the Minuteman bike path.

From Rt. 2 coming from Metro West:

Rt. 2 East. Take the Pleasant St. exit (Arlington). Drive about 2 miles until you reach the Mass Ave. lights. You will see the Cambridge Savings bank on your right. Go straight across Mass Ave. and head down Mystic St. (which is Rt. 3A/60 East). You will see the Minuteman bike path on your left. Right after that is Winslow Ave. on your left (you will have to make a U-turn to get to Winslow Ave).

Galapagos Report

Maybe it was the combination of seasick medications I was on, but you should have seen that huge, polka-dotted fish, man! Wait a minute, it wasn't medications; I was in the Galapagos Islands. I joined Jonathan and Christine Bird, along with 11 other dive adventurers from around the world (one couple was from Brazil!) for an incredible 10 day adventure.

I started out by myself, flying from Boston to Newark. Here I happened to meet up with three others from our group; a husband/wife team from Spokane, Washington and their dive shop owner. Apparently their son backed out at the last minute so he would be able to graduate high school this spring. So, why not bring your local dive shop owner, especially if he had just trained you on a rebreather for this trip!

For the first time since I've been flying out of Newark, I didn't have any delays! Thinking the key to flying out of Newark was an international flight; I spent the next eight hours flying to Guayaquil, Ecuador. There was a short stopover in Panama City that I didn't even know about until I was in Newark. I didn't realize what an effect it had until the next morning when I e-mailed by boyfriend. He had tracked the flight from Newark, but apparently it only tracks until the first foreign-soil stop. He saw the flight land in Panama City and stay there! After I assured him I was safely in Guayaquil, I went sightseeing with the group.

My tour book didn't give the city the best reputation, but thankfully I never saw any rats! Just lots of iguanas...everywhere. Guayaquil seems to have their own version of the Big Dig going on, as there was road construction everywhere! The city has made some improvements to clean up. One such project was the Malecedon 2000, a 2 km walkway along the river. Granted, the river is muddy brown, but the botanical gardens and fountains are beautiful and made you forget you were in a city.

Ok, on to the diving! After pooling our money together to make sure the group's gear got on the plane (underwater photographers and rebreather divers carry a lot of heavy stuff!), we boarded a very crowded plane to head to Baltra. Upon arrival, we had to disinfect our shoes and pay a \$100 park fee. Comparing passports later, I noticed the guy taking the fee wasn't stamping passports, but the girl was. Of course, I had gone to the guy, so I didn't get the cool stamp...how am I ever supposed to fill up my passport?!

We were met by friendly Aggressor (is that an oxymoron?) divemasters Paula and Chris, who gathered our gear together. Paula helped get the gear loaded onto a truck and then traveled with it to the boat. Chris was in charge of the 14 divers; he got us loaded onto the bus. Fifteen minutes later, we were standing on the dock, watching sea lions and marine iguanas lounging by the rocks. We were loaded, 7 at a time, onto a Zodiac that brought us to the Aggressor I. We were served lunch and then got our gear together for the checkout dive.

As I executed my giant stride, I felt something slip down my leg and over my fin tip. A quick check confirmed it was indeed my weight belt. Not going under without that... this could be a long week! Good thing I have a weight integrated BC; there weren't anymore weight belts and a search conducted by my buddies didn't turn up anything. Paula said not to worry; they'd find it next week on that checkout dive.

We had a long crossing to get to Wolf Island, about 14 hours or so. We spent the evening unpacking and getting settled, getting to know each other and the crew. The next day we arrived at Wolf. I skipped the first dive, as I wasn't feeling so great. We had lunch and then got ready for the afternoon dives. I managed both of these without many problems. A few small schools of hammerheads were out in the distance, but didn't come in close. There was lots of cleaning station activity, a marble ray, several green sea turtles, and lots of spotted morays.

I surfaced from the second dive with a splitting headache. I hoped food would make it better, especially since the boat was grilling on the upper deck. Unfortunately, I missed out on the excellent food and was the sickest I would be on the trip. Seasickness coupled with recovering from a cold doesn't make for the best diving! I was fortunate there were two doctors on board (Christine and the guy from Spokane) to administer advice and seasick medications. One of the crewmembers also helped take care of me. Marco made sure I was drinking plenty of fluids, as well as eating. He even made a special Ecuadorian tea to help settle my stomach.

After sleeping away the next morning (the first at Darwin), and missing the first of several whale sharks, I felt well enough to have lunch with the group. They were all relieved to see I had recovered and happier still when I suited up for the afternoon dives. I saw three whale sharks the first dive, but could not swim fast enough to get a good photo op. I also overheated; I had been advised to wear a 5mm-hooded shorty over my 7mm wetsuit. I don't know if it was due to El Nino,

but the water was 77 degrees! I pulled the hood of my head to cool down and spent the rest of the week diving in my 7mm with a tropical hood to keep my hair out my face.

The next two days of diving at Darwin I saw spotted eagle rays and several more whale sharks, a few of which I had close encounters with and could photograph. There were a few hammerheads that came in close, but not the huge schools I had heard about. In addition to the current not being fast enough for them to come to the cleaning stations, they were skittish about coming close to where the bubble blowers were.

Since we had been successful with the whale sharks and hammerheads, we decided to head south to Cousin's Rock for some diving with sea lions. The water was cooler here, but comfortable (at least for me). This was my favorite dive; it was very relaxing and peaceful. You didn't have to keep looking for whale sharks or hammerheads; don't get me wrong, they were cool. You just had to keep your attention focused on them or you missed them. Cousin's Rock was a leisurely dive along ledges covered in black coral. I didn't realize black coral is actually green when it's alive; the way the sun was reflecting off them was very beautiful. We saw a few seahorses, spotted eagle rays, and then the main attraction. We spent the entire second dive just focusing on the sea lions. There were three females at one time playing and checking us out, while Christine snorkeled to keep them entertained. A bull would make passes to make sure we weren't harming his harem; occasionally he would bark at you underwater!

Our last dive of the trip was at Gordon Rock, where we were hoping to see manta rays. The last couple of weeks Aggressor had seen one, so we were encouraged. Unfortunately, the manta rays weren't there when we were.

We got cleaned up and did a couple of land tours, where we could see lava flow formations, sea lion colonies, and lots of land iguanas. We then headed into town for souvenir shopping and dinner. All of us called an early night so we get packed and ready to head back to Guayaquil, where we spent one more day finishing up our shopping.

Back in Newark, I learned international flights were not the key to hassle-free flying, as my flight back to Boston was delayed by an hour.

49th BOSTON SEA ROVERS CLINIC, MARCH 8-9, 2003

The annual two-day clinic will be held at the Fairmont Copley Plaza Hotel on March 8 and 9, 2003 and features forty daytime seminars covering all aspects of scuba diving and the marine environment, a Saturday Evening Film Festival, and the Grand Ballroom Exhibitors Hall, filled with over sixty leading companies in the ocean realm. The show attracts the cream of the crop of Northeast divers: those who are serious about their diving, those who buy equipment and want to know what is new and available, those who go on diving trips, and those who dive locally. Attendees jam the hotel during the day and the theater for the Saturday evening film festival.

An important aspect of our weekend Clinic is the Grand Ballroom Exhibitor's Hall, filled with leaders diving goods, services, and exotic diving destinations. Thousands of Northeast divers look forward each year to being able to see the latest equipment, meet with travel resort professionals, and here from the experts what's new, and what's available for the upcoming dive year.

SCUBA diving is a unique and fascinating sport, with an enormous amount of fascination for participants and observers alike. Considering recent ocean-related news events, from the tragedy of the Kursk, to the hype over "The Perfect Storm", to animated discussions regarding fishing and whaling problems and it's clear that the ocean is important to everyone. The Sea Rovers Clinic was and still is devoted to presenting issues related to diving to the general public, and to keeping the public informed, and involved.

But the Sea Rovers also do much more than just run a Clinic for the diving public. On the Friday preceding the weekend clinic, the Rovers also conduct a program at the Fairmont Copley Plaza designed to provide local secondary school students and their teachers with a "window on the underwater world". The Career Opportunities in Marine Sciences

presentations cover topics about the world's oceans, the people who study them and opportunities for students to study and protect the ocean environments. Each year, hundreds of students are provided an opportunity to learn about professional careers in the ocean world because of the Sea Rovers.

The Sea Rovers also give back to the community. Proceeds from the annual clinic are used primarily for scholarships related to ocean study and to the support of SeaMark, an organization dedicated to helping children with disabilities.
